Macy's Parade—A Big Hit



Taking place every year on Thursday, November 25, this parade has created an ever-lasting memory for those who have experienced it. Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade has been around since 1924, with amazing people from around the world.

The first ever parade took place in the year 1924, with over 250,000 people watching, making the parade a huge success and causing Macy's to turn it into an annual event. Macy's store workers were dressed in vibrant outfits as they walked the streets. Floats, professional bands, and animals borrowed from the Central Park Zoo were lining the streets as well. At the end of the parade, Santa Claus was crowned "King of the Kiddies" on the 34th street, Macy's store entrance. Many news reporters didn't care much for this parade causing the parade to barely be covered over the news in the first year.

As the parade grew more and more, many things changed about the parade, including the live animals being exchanged for balloons in the year 1928. When Mrs. Kalakis went to the parade to see the Davis High School marching band, a New York City Police officer told her that the owner of Macy's switched to balloons because he wanted everyone to see the parade, including the children. He decided that by bringing the parade up in the air, the small children could enjoy the parade over the heads of the adults. In the year 1933, over 1 million people watched the parade in person or over live television. In 1934, the first ever Mickey Mouse balloon appeared. But sadly, in the years 1942 to 1944, the parade was cancelled due to World War II and the supply and demand increase for rubber and helium. The next year the parade started up again and became famous nationwide. The parade was first ever televised on NBC news in the year 1953 and still is today. As of 1985, the parade also officially started being led by the New York City Police Department Highway Patrol.

Many injuries have occurred over the years of the parade causing safety measures to come up. In the year 1993, gusts of wind pushed

Author of *Hatchet* Dies at 82

On October 13, Gary Paulsen, the author of the popular book Hatchet, passed away at his home in New Mexico at the age of 82. Random House Children's Books said that Paulsen died "suddenly" on the day it happened but did not provide any further detail at the time of announcement. Paulsen's son Jim said the cause of death was cardiac arrest.



Paulsen wrote about 200 books in his lifetime, including books such as "Hatchet" and "Dogsong". His books have sold over 35 million copies and counting. Several of them are based on Paulsen's life experiences, such as "Gone to the Woods", which is based off how Paulsen often played in the woods to avoid his parents' arguing when he was young. Paulsen's last novel, "Northwind", will be published in January. Paulsen got into writing one night when he entered a library to warm himself up. The librarian asked if Paulsen had a library card. He said no, so she gave him one, along with a notebook and pencil, and told him to read everything he could and write down what he thought about what he read. That was Paulsen's first introduction to writing. When he was 14, Paulsen ran away and joined a circus, then came home and forged his father's signature so he could join the Army. One day in 1965, Paulsen decided to try to write a novel. He rented a cabin in Minnesota and got to work.

Paulsen's first book was called "The Special War" and was published in

the Sonic the Hedgehog balloon into a lamppost, damaging the balloon and injuring a child and an off-duty police officer. In 1997, high winds caused a Cat in the Hat balloon to go flying into a lamppost. Falling debris struck a parade-goer, fracturing her skull and putting her in a coma for a month. One of the more recent injuries was in 2005, when the M&M's balloon hit a streetlight causing parts of the light to fall on two sisters. Luckily only minor injuries occurred. Now, many of the balloon's number of people have increased for carrying the balloon down the streets. Larger balloons based off lovable cartoon characters have as many as 90 people pulling the balloons along. While smaller balloons are carried by a range of 1 to 30 people depending on the size.

Since 1924, participants in Macy's parades have always been colleagues, family and friends, and performing talents that have helped in the making of these parades. This tradition has been a memory for many and will hopefully be a memory for many more in the future. -Samantha Garrick

1966. For several years, Paulsen wrote western books for adults under a fake name. He made enough money to keep up a simple, rural life, living off the things he found and hunted. Paulsen always had a love for the outdoors. He even took part in the Iditarod race three times before stopping due to heart problems. His love for nature is often reflected in many of his books, including "Hatchet", which won a Newbery Honor, as did his books "Dogsong" and "The Winter Room". Paulsen spent his childhood with an overprotective mother and an angry father, both alcoholics struggling with their miserable marriage. Paulsen was socially isolated and basically took care of himself. By the time he was a teenager, he was making his own money and even hunting his own food with a makeshift bow and arrow. The great outdoors was his escape from his sad reality. Paulsen graduated from high school and raised his own money to attend college. He served in the U.S. Army during his early 20s, then quit his job as an aerospace engineer to follow his true passion: writing. Paulsen started out with writing for a small magazine but eventually began to write novels. Paulsen married Ruth Wright Paulsen, an illustrator, in 1970. She did art for many of his books. Ruth, along with their son and two grandchildren, continues the family. Paulsen was a man from Minnesota who loved writing, nature, and writing about nature. He has won many awards for his works and is a celebrated author. His memory will continue to live on through his family and his books. -Kenna LeRoy

Gabrielle "Gabby" Venora Peitio's body was found on September 19th, only 8 days after her family reported her missing. She was taking a cross-country road trip with her fiancé, Brian Laundrie. As much speculation as there has been about what happened, who did it, and why, it is also just as important to remember these people and who they were before they became a victim.

Gabby was born March 19, 1999. She grew up in Blue Point, New York and attended Bayport-Blue Point High School there. She was

the oldest of her siblings and half siblings. Family was very important to Gabby, and she was very close to her father, Joseph Petito. Joe and Gabby's stepmom, Tara, had other children. Gabby's mother also remarried to man named Jim Schmidt.

Gabby graduated high school in 2017. She immediately was very interested in travelling and spent much of her time hiking and being outside. She met Brian Laundrie in high school, but they didn't begin dating until after they graduated. In 2019, they went on a road trip together from the east-coast to California. They visited different cities and camped along the way. Gabby and Brian frequently posted to social media about their trips. They announced their relationship together in 2020 after a year of being together. In that post, they also announced their engagement.

In 2020, the couple began to work on a van so they could live in and go on road trips. They created a YouTube channel together called "Nomadic Statik". They were getting things ready to go on a huge road trip for 2021. Gabby worked as a pharmacy technician to make money and quit before they left. Gabby really wanted to become a full-time traveler and was extremely excited for the road trip. At this point, Gabby amounted to around 100,000 followers on Instagram. She also created a blog with the same name as her YouTube Channel.

Together, they were going to travel for 4 months to many national parks. Gabby told her parents she would update them as much as possible on every detail of their trip. Starting early July, the couple posted to their Instagram accounts of pictures from Kansas. During the trip, she worked on her blog and posted a video to her YouTube account. As their trip progressed, they traveled to Colorado, Utah, and, unfortunately, Gabby's trip ended early in Wyoming.

The circumstances of Gabby's death are not clear, but one thing is obvious, she was a beautiful and brilliant woman. Gabby was full of life and had an extremely bright personality. From her posts to her differing social media accounts, it's apparent how much she enjoyed seeing the



creek and Centerville, all with a good performance and experience to take back with them.


When asked about the volleyball season, Bella Clifford (8th grade, JV team) Said that "I think that we worked really well as a team this year, but there is always room for improvement."



However, our crime statistics fall into the national average in every category but one, violence against women, where our stats are disproportionately high. We are ranked 11th nationally for sexual assault and in the state of Utah one out of every five girls will be sexually assaulted before they turn 18. Worse, according to research only 11% of sexual assaults are reported. Which means that our stats are even more abysmal.

It's easy to think that these things may happen, but they don't happen here. The scary thing though is that it is happening here. It's happening to our friends and sisters on our campus. There was new graffiti in the boy's main bathroom during the month of September. The graffiti was asking for votes on what female body parts guys preferred. There were

Make a stand to help our female students know that this is a safe place for them to come to. Our administration is wonderful, and they sincerely care. Choir Festival



Last year our school had a really outdated food lab. The lab desperately needed a remodel, it was falling apart. The appliances were old and just needed replaced.


