Tim Burton's Nightmare Before Christmas: See it in Concert!

December is a time for laughter, fun, joy, and spending time with friends and family. Many people get together with their families and have dinner and enjoy the company of relatives or close friends. Some do this by watching movies, one of which may be The Nightmare Before Christmas. This film was created by Tim Burton, directed by Henry Selick, and has been a popular movie since October 13, 1993. Now, 29 years later, we can see the show as a concert in the Abravanel Hall, located in Salt Lake City, Utah.



Performed by Utah symphony, the concert is a “delightfully quirky score from Danny Elfman drives Tim Burton’s fantastical tale of Jack Skellington’s plot for Halloween Town to take over Christmas—and the hilariously haunting results,” UtahSymphony.org says. Not only will the concert be representing the original show, but they also have other details that you can do before and after the show, such as,

“Arrive early to make a spooky ornament and take photos in our special Halloween town. Visit our giving tree in the lobby and make a special donation to the Utah Symphony this holiday season,” as said by the Utah Symphony Event Music Director, Thierry Fischer. Show times include 7:00 pm on the 21st, 22nd, and 23rd of December. Children over the age of 5 are permitted, along with teens, adults, and elders.

The venue for the show is Abravanel Hall, Salt Lake City Utah. The theater was originally named Symphony Hall because of its dedication to the musical industry of Utah’s many Symphonies. The hall “was renamed in 1993 to honor Maurice Abravanel, who conducted the Utah Symphony Orchestra for more than 30 years. Although he retired before having the chance to conduct there, he was pleased with the way it turned out. Forty years later, the hall continues to house world-class performances.”

Tim Burton has created many film ideas, and few have been published. For this film that the Utah Symphony is producing, he got his inspiration from a few movie specials. “After completing his short film Vincent in 1982, Burton, who was then employed at Walt Disney Feature Animation, wrote a three-page poem titled The Nightmare Before Christmas, drawing inspiration from television specials of Rudolph the Red-Nosed Reindeer, How the Grinch Stole Christmas! (1966) and the poem A Visit from St. Nicholas,” The Nightmare Before Christmas-Wikipedia said. We can see the inspiration of these television specials throughout the film, as the Character Jack Skellington tries to recreate Christmas essentially stealing the idea of it from Santa Clause, as a reference to How the Grinch Stole Christmas. Other similarities include the red noses on the skeleton reindeer, the red coat that Sally makes for Jack, and many more references to the films that the ideas were drawn from.

So, on December 21st, 22nd, or 23rd, come see the Utah Symphony perform The Nightmare Before Christmas at the Abravanel Hall in Salt Lake City, Utah. With multiple things to see, it would be an enjoyable performance for any age, and a wonderful experience to have before the holiday season comes to an end. -Kaitlyn Turley

Brian Froud: The Artistic Tolkien



The cult classic *The Dark Crystal* came out in 1982, just like FJH. The film was the first fantasy film made by Jim Henson, the creator of the Muppets. This film was made entirely with puppets and animatronics. Those puppets (along with architecture and props) were designed by artist Brian Froud.

Brian Froud started his career as a commercial illustrator in the UK. He illustrated multiple children's books and released an anthology of his art called *The Land of Froud*. This book caught the eye of Jim Henson, who asked Brian to help with the film he was working on: *The Dark Crystal*.

The film was about how a planet called Thra used to be green and good until two new races appeared: the Cruel Skeksis and the Gentle Mystics (or called UrRu if you delve into more lore). The Skeksis cracked a crystal that is basically the heart of Thra, which caused the land to slowly die. So, a Gelfling named Jen has to find the shard of the Crystal and heal it before the three suns line up. If he doesn't make it in time, then the Skeksis will have power over the stars and live forever. Brian Froud drew designs for every single thing you see in the film. Usually, when drawing, he started with the eye. During a BTS video for the film, he described the Skeksis as part reptilian, part predatory bird, and part dragon.

Brian Froud also worked on another film with Jim Henson called *Labyrinth*. The film featured more humans in it (Jim Henson thought that the *Dark Crystal* didn't do well because there weren't any humans). The film is about how a teenage girl named Sarah (played by a young Jennifer Connelly) is forced to babysit her annoying baby brother Toby. She jokingly wishes that Toby be taken away by the Goblins from her favorite book *Labyrinth*. Her wish is actually granted by the Goblin King (played by rockstar David Bowie), so she must go through a labyrinth filled with illusions and strange creatures to save Toby from becoming a Goblin.

His latest work was on the 2019 Netflix series *The Dark Crystal: Age of Resistance*. His creations are still amazing to this day. -Henry Smith

The WWI Christmas Truce

Down in the Western Front of Europe in 1914, British/French troops were stopping the German troops' attack through Belgium and into France. It was in the middle of WWI and worry and depression filled nations. It was near Christmas time and several "peace initiatives" were trying to be made by many different people and groups. British suffragettes and Pope Benedict were some of the people trying to bring these initiatives; "[that] the guns may fall silent at least upon the night the angels sang," begged the Pope.

It hadn't been all violence and gunfire, however, for those among the Western Front, in fact, there was common fraternization. While there had been no official treaty agreeing to no gunfire or attacks on Christmas, the natural instinct of the soldiers on the front line had made Christmas in 1914 somewhat enjoyable.

"First the Germans would sing one of their carols and then we would sing one of ours, until we started up 'O Come, All ye Faithful' the Germans immediately joined in singing the same hymn to the Latin word *Adeste Fideles*. And I thought, well, this is really the most extraordinary thing—two nations both singing the same carol in the middle of a war," said Graham Williams, a British rifleman.

On that Christmas, there was no hostility between the 100,000 British/French and German soldiers. Army men started crossing onto No Man's Land and the two sides started exchanging small gifts like souvenirs: buttons and hats, tobacco, alcohol, and food. Both sides sang carols and the Germans put candles in their trenches and on trees. Recently killed soldiers were also able to be retrieved and brought back to their side's trenches, where a service was held for the fallen. -Megan Barker

The History of Figure Skating

Jackson Haines was the creator of the modern form of figure skating. He was born in New York in 1840. At a young age, he began his career in ballet, but he also practiced skating. At one point during his career, he began to skate to music instead of listening to his teachers' instructions. He meshed the style of ballet with the art of figure skating, which created the art forms we see in the Olympics today.

The oldest known date when skating is believed to have begun was 1800 BCE. The blades at that time were made from the bones of deer, horses, or cows that were strapped to the foot. Modern skates have become much more advanced and are made with types of metal.

The term figure skating comes from the patterns that were made on the ice. In recent years, this hasn't been as important in competition. Instead there are the multiple different types of figure skating, including freestyle, ice dance, pairs as well as synchronized team skating.

Figure skating has been an Olympic sport since 1908 and was officially the very first competition in the Winter Olympics. The current minimum age to compete in figure skating was recently raised to 17. This decision was made for the Winter Olympics coming up in 2026. "Gradually increasing the age limit from 15 to 17 is necessary for the sake of protecting the physical and mental health, and emotional well-being of skaters," officials have said. The sport of ice skating puts a huge strain on the body. After retirement, most participants have serious spine and hip injuries. Those injuries come from the immense pressure of landing jumps and constantly falling on the ice.


Stop Updating Our Laptops; Update Our School


All I Want for Christmas is You



Las Diferentes Costumbres Navideñas de Países Hispanos




